Govan's role as an important regional hub of racial justice and the arts is reflected in an all-star lineup being assembled for the second annual Juneteenth concert.

The show is again being assembled by our own Minister for Racial Justice, Lea Gilmore, herself an acclaimed vocalist and human rights advocate. She says it will include blues, jazz and folk selections.

#### **LETTER FROM PASTOR SHANNON**

Friends.

Since March, I've been serving as your Bridge Pastor here at Govans. A Bridge Pastor is a temporary designation to "bridge the gap" between the Permanent Pastor leaving and the Interim Pastor arriving. If you can believe it, we're about halfway through our time together.

I've been thinking about what it means to be a "bridge," that is, someone who helps lead the way to move from one place to



another. Not literally, of course; I have no interest in being trampled on!

When I think of a bridge I think about connection, the connection of two different places, both in space and time, providing safe passage over terrain that would otherwise be difficult.

No metaphor is perfect, so forgive this one if it goes too far, but this bridge metaphor has expanded even more since the collapse of the Key Bridge. I admit I did not cross it regularly, but I have noticed a significant difference in traffic in and around the city since then. As a Bridge Pastor, my main job is to help "traffic" or make sure the church's work moves smoothly until you're back on solid ground.

However, the most important part of a bridge is ensuring it has a solid foundation. My main work now is with the staff on their leadership goals, helping the Session and committees take ownership of their work, and updating the church's bylaws and other governing documents. That last one doesn't sound very interesting, but as my husband says, "Paperwork saves lives." In this case, it clarifies, but you get the idea.

My job is also to help calm the anxieties of crossing the bridge. Change can be hard, and an unknown future can sometimes be a little scary. We mourn what we've left behind on the journey, but there is also opportunity on the other side of the bridge. One of the opportunities in a new interim and permanent pastor is taking the next step into who Govans is today, honoring the past but letting go of what no longer serves you. This will take time, and the process should not be rushed, but don't worry, this change isn't permanent, and you'll be back on solid ground soon enough.



### **GOVANS GARDEN GROUP NEEDS YOUR HELP!**

We used all the compost prepping the garden! The veggies and our seedlings are off to a great start!

#### What is compost?

Composting is the natural process of recycling organic matter, such as leaves and food scraps, into a valuable fertilizer that can enrich soil and plants. Fondly referred to by farmers as "black gold," compost is rich in nutrients and can be used for gardening, horticulture, and agriculture.

#### How can you help?

Bring in your compost to support the veggies/garden soil for months and years to come. We want folks to bring in veggie scraps, tea bags, coffee, and eggs shells. Egg shells are ok!

No rubber bands, meat, plastics, aluminum, oils, or animal matter.

#### What happens next?

If you'd like to help with composting, YOU MUST add

your name to the list! The gardeners turn the soil each

week. Once we know you know how to do it (come hang with us for a little training), you are welcome to put the compost in the rotating container and give it some spins! Each individual/ family can support our compost black bins, behind the pre-school playground, near the garden plot. Rogue dumping will not be tolerated. Sylvia and Missy will find you!

#### WHAT YOU CAN AND CAN'T COMPOST IN YOUR BACKYARD

#### COMPOSTED



- Cardboard (uncoated, small pieces)
- Coffee grounds and filters
- Eggshells
- Fireplace ashes (from natural wood only)
- Fruits and vegetables
- Grass clippings
- Hair and fur
- Hay and straw
- Houseplants Leaves
- Newspaper (shredded)
- Nutshells
- Paper (uncoated, small pieces)

- Wood chips Yard trimmings

#### SHOULD NOT BE COMPOSTED



- Black walnut tree leaves or twigs (release substances that might be harmful to plants)
- substances harmful to plants)
- problems and attract pests such as rodents and flies)
- Diseased or insect-ridden plants (diseases or insects might survive and be transferred to other plants)
- Fats, grease, lard, oils\* (create odor problems and attract pests such as rodents and flies)
- Meat or fish bones and scraps (create odor problems, attract pests such as rodents and flies, and might also carry
- Pet feces or litter\* (might contain parasites, bacteria, germs, pathogens, and viruses harmful to humans)
- Yard trimmings treated with chemical pesticides (might kill beneficial compost-ing organisms)

Check with your local composting or recycling

The holiday commemorates the end of slavery in the U.S. and takes its name from the day in 1865 when enslaved Black Americans in Texas learned of emancipation. President Joe Biden made it a federal holiday in 2021.

The concert is free and will begin at 7 p.m. on June 10th in the sanctuary at 5828 York Road.

Lea says she views the Govan's concert as a celebration of African-American musical heritage.

Several members of The Baltimore Symphony Orchestra are on the playlist as part of the Baltimore Symphony Musicians Foundation outreach.



"There are so many young composers of color these days that we have a lot of music to choose from in the classical tradition, in addition to gospel, R&B, blues and other genres," says BSO bassist Jonathan Jensen, who will be performing. "Getting to work with Lea and members of the church makes this project especially rewarding."

The program will include works by a number of important Black composers and performers. Among them: "Four Women," a tribute to the victims of the 1963 church bombing in Birmingham written by Nina Simone, a civil rights activist ranked by Rolling Stone as one of the greatest singers of all time, and "Brown Baby," written by Oscar Brown Jr. after the birth of his first son.

A contemporary selection, "Unified Prayer," was composed by B.E. Boykin, a Virginia native and graduate of Spellman College, the Westminster Choir College and Georgia State University.

Several of the performers are familiar to Govan's music programs, including Roderick Demmings Jr., an award-winning pianist and organist who, at the age of 12, performed a solo at Carnegie Hall. He later graduated from Hopkin's Peabody Conservatory and has appeared around the world, including a tour in South Africa and performances at the Vatican and the Kennedy Center.

Keith Snipes, a Baltimore actor, poet, vocalist, and songwriter, and has appeared at several Govan's events as well as performances at Baltimore's Keystone Korner and Washington's Takoma Station, among other venues. He'll sing "Brown Baby" and join with Lea in a rendition of Brook Benton's "Rockin Good Way."

Our own Andy Wilson will play songs by the late Delta bluesman Son House and influential folk singer Elizabeth Cotten.

# EASTER SEASON MUSIC NEWS

Sunday May 21 is a joyous celebration of music; the Govans Handbell Choir will be presenting a glorious theme on the hymn tune Hyfrydol, which is in the celebration of Easter.

There are seven Sundays in the Easter season, and with May 21 being the last of them, we are reigning in the joy of the season through this beautiful tune. We will also have the joy of hearing a beautiful handbell duet for eight bells, played by Maria Wong and Ashley Short.

Did I say two people will be ringing eight bells? Yes, I did! Typically, ringers ring with one bell in a hand at a time, and if they have to ring more than two bells in any given piece of music, they have to put down a bell (or bells) and pick up the new bell(s) in just enough time to come in with the notes. Both Maria and Ashley will be

playing a piece that requires two bells in each hand, known as "four in hand."

Then in June, you get to look forward to the choir singing a very challenging piece in Russian. Bogoroditse Devo, or Rejoice, Mother of God, is a choral piece part of Rachmaninoff's Vespers "All-Night-Vigil."

Rachmaninoff composed this piece in 1915, after he had written another lengthy choral piece of similar vein, Liturgy of Saint John Chrysostom, which he was not satisfied with. The All Night Vigil is a rich piece of choral music history, and is considered one of the biggest choral masterpieces of the early 1900's. This movement of the piece is the most-performed movement out of the entire 15 movement piece. Join us on June 4 for this musical masterpiece!

Smith had been serving in a part time capacity as Interim Christian Education Coordinator since coming to Govans in September. At the March meeting of Session she was moved to a full-time position in recognition of the expanded duties and responsibilities her position has come to include. In addition to her Children's Sermon duties in each service, Smith leads Sunday School classes for youth of all ages every Sunday in the Youth Room at 9:45. The classes use discussion, storytelling, art-making and other activities to encourage everyone present to think about scripture and faith in their daily lives. Her other responsibilities are extensive, ranging from coaching youth lay leaders, to organizing events such as September's Sunday School Kick-Off and Waffle Bar to helping coordinate 3rd Sunday Youth Mixers done in conjunction with Roland Park Presbyterian and Faith Presbyterian.

Smith praises the sense of community she's found since coming to Govans, and particularly appreciates finding through the Church a connection to Woodberry Crossing, where she now works one day a week helping care for the goats and sheep. "I've been working on events and helping gather people together all my life," she says of her experiences at Govans to date. "One of the things I've gained in working with the youth is learning how to allow things to evolve. Even the Sunday sermon. Sometimes you lead and sometimes you have to allow yourself to be led. It's really magical."



#### **EDUCATION BUILDING RENOVATIONS**

The Education Building that houses the Govans Preschool and the Senior Network of North Baltimore (SNNB) was built in 1958 and features two window walls that are badly in need of replacement. This project will replace them with brick façades and new energy efficient windows including a canopy covering the entrance to the SNNB. Additionally, the project includes a complete regrading and resurfacing of the playground, and new exterior signage will be installed across our entire campus.

#### **Frequently Asked Questions**

**Who is working with Govans on this project?** The architect is Jerome Gray and the contractor is A.R. Marani. Members of Govans staff and volunteers from the Facilities committee have been working with them for over two years on the design and planning of the project. The Session has also been kept updated throughout this process.

**How long will construction take?** The project will be done in the 3 phases with a planned start in June 2024. Each phase is expected to last about 3 months. We will be replacing the west wall first, followed by the south wall and SNNB canopy and finally the playground. The brick façades and canopy are expected to be done by the end of 2024. Work on the playground is expected to be completed in February 2025 depending on weather.

Will the preschool and SNNB be able to operate during construction? Yes, maintaining preschool and SNNB operations is essential. In order for the preschool to remain operational and also have space for play, we are planning to have both Sharp Hall and the Multipurpose Room converted to classroom space during the first two phases. Due to state licensing requirements the classrooms need to remain in place, and as a result, other activities in those rooms will be severely limited between June and December 2024. The SNNB will be moving some of their programming to the Gallery, Waverly Room, and Youth Room. We know this is a great inconvenience to our building users. We ask for your patience and understanding.

Why are we regrading the playground? For many years the playground has been subject to flooding that impacts the Carriage House. The regrading will solve this issue.

Why are we getting new signs? Our campus can be confusing and unwelcoming to first time visitors. New and improved signage will help solve that problem and improve our curb appeal.

**How much will this cost?** Session has approved \$1.3 million for this project. To pay for the project, we have \$500,000 allocated in the preschool and major maintenance fund. For the remaining amount, we will borrow from our pooled endowment fund and repay this loan over 20 years. Eighty percent of the repayment will come from preschool revenue, and the remaining from the church operating budget.
