The Historical Truth of Govans Relationship With Race and Why it Matters

September 22, 2024, approximately 11:30 am Sharp Hall, Govans Presbyterian Church

Rev. David Harris and Myra Brosius will give a presentation with a brief opportunity for discussion, after service on September 22, 2024. This is intended to present the Truth and Reconciliation Committee's research on Govans' history through the lens of racial justice.

Unveiling of the New Sanctuary Artwork and Reception

Govans Presbyterian Church Sanctuary Sunday, October 13, During Worship Service

After receiving six inquiries and four proposals to commission a Black Baltimore artist to create and display two pieces of art in our sanctuary to provide racially diverse images in our worship space that is currently Eurocentric, Ky Vassor was selected. They will be present as their artwork is unveiled during the worship service.

Objectives of the artwork, as stated in the request for proposals are:

- Create images of people of color in our worship space to communicate that all are welcome and children of God.
- Have something visual for people to meditate on during church services, offering a narrative, story, or way of being that is different from the Eurocentric imagery currently in the church.
- Challenge members to a more expansive view of God and people.
- Bring a contemporary element into the sanctuary.
- Incorporate artwork that is reflective of worship or community.

Jackson will lead us in a discussion about Diversity, Equity and Inclusion after service in Sharp Hall.





Through personal stories and cultural analysis, Hong exposes the racial barriers and ingrained prejudices that continue to affect Asian Americans today.





Thoughtful Readings & Resources

School has begun and that means getting kids to bed early, chaotic breakfasts, packing lunches, and brushing hair. Here are a few great books about taking pride in black hair, which can be shared with children of all colors, and hair types. These books show young girls who are (or learn to be) proud of the hair they have. This can help girls withstand the oppressive forces they often endure as they grow into young women and face pressure to conform to and are compared to Eurocentric ideals of beauty.

A 2021 study by Dove revealed that 53% of Black mothers reported that their daughters were discriminated against because of their hair. Reported numbers were higher if they attended predominantly white schools.




This is an oldie but a goodie! For over 20 years, Tarpley's book has helped African American girls feel happy with their hair!

Hair Like Mine by Latashia M. Perry, Illustrated by Bea Jackson


The child in this book doesn't like her different hair, but her wise mother helps her to see that we are all different, unique in our own ways and that it's okay to be different.

If My Hair Had a Voice by Dana Marie Miroball, illustrated by Patricia Grannum

This is a more whimsical entry into the forum of Black Hair books, where a young girl learns the history of Black hair. "If your hair had a voice, it would sing of diversity and identity. It would tell you stories of our history."
